Why is a community vision important?

- The process of developing a community vision provides an opportunity to identify and respect what those before us have accomplished, and use their lessons learned to move confidently into the **future**.
- Community visions help people respond to **change** and action by motivating, **inspiring**, and exciting them.







Annual population growth rate(a)(b)





Graph 2 - Mean weekly housing costs (a), tenure and landlord type, 1999-00 to 2019-20 (b)













Map of net gains and losses by LGA





Lismore City - between 2016 and 2021 for people aged 18 to 24 years











Employment (total) by industry 2021/22








Employment capacity by industry 2021/22










Quarterly unemployment rate









Sources of income per household







Change in employment (total) by industry, 2011/12 to 2021/22 Lismore City






Change in registered businesses by industry, 2019 to 2022








Change in household type, 2016 to 2021





Resident workers age group, 2021



Change in resident workers qualifications, 2016 to 2021

















Population and age structure map - total persons

Lismore City, 2021 to 2041 number change







JobSeeker rate over time, Lismore City and benchmarks








Value of total building approvals



Measuring activity with spend data

What is it?


- Source of Council's spend data
- All card transactions anonymised
- Weighted for non-card transactions
- Defined by:
 - Type and origin of cardholder
 - Type of business
 - Location and time of transaction
- Privacy measures determine the granularity
- Online spend no business location

What can we use it for?

- · Regular reporting
- Investment attraction
- Online and escape leakage analysis
- Economic development strategies and policy evaluation
- Event impact assessment
- Disaster response and recovery
- Grant applications and acquittals




Lismore and NSW Testing Lismore's resilience



- Lismore was hit hard by the effects of COVID lockdowns
- But managed to outperform NSW's month-on-month growth in certain periods throughout the pandemic, particularly in 2021
- However, flood events in 2022 saw Lismore take five months before spending approached 2021 levels



Category spending Resilience across different sectors




Retail is Department Stores & Clothing and Specialised & Luxury Goods combined

- Retail spending was the hardest hit by the floods
- Jan-Jun 2023 compared to Jan-Jun 2019 pre-pandemic levels:
 - Dining & Entertainment spending is 15% higher
 - Professional Services spending is 3% higher
 - Retail spending growth remains flat



Different places, different stories



- The floods had the biggest impact on Lismore CBD
- Some businesses absorbed diverted demand
- Since the floods, some places have seen strong spending growth




Average daily/nightly spend Thursday and Friday are Lismore's busiest

■2023 Average Daily Spend by Day of Week


