





FREE COMMUNITY GATHERING MARKS FLOOD ANNIVERSARY

Lismore City Council is hosting a community gathering – One Year On – at the Lismore Quadrangle on Saturday, 7 April to mark one year since the March 2017 flood.

The afternoon will give people a chance to share stories and connect with one another while honouring the resilience and strength of the Lismore community.

There will be live music with Luke Vassella, Lady Mondegreen and The Button Collective, a barbecue, community arts activities and stalls by emergency services and community organisations.

At 6pm there will also be a performance of The Overtopping – a sitespecific multisensory theatrical experience based on stories of the 2017 flood and its aftermath.



The Overtopping is a creative investigation into disaster, recovery, trauma and resilience based around cyclone Debbie, which showcases some of the best emerging and professional artists of varying abilities working in Lismore. It was performed in Lismore's back alleys during the Artstate festival last December and includes dance, puppetry, sound art, projection, creative lighting, live storytelling and water art.

The work was devised by local creative agency RealArtWorks, a community group whose own studios were filled with floodwater during the March 2017 disaster.

A free courtesy bus will be provided to and from the One Year On community event, and people are encouraged to bring the family and picnic rugs to spend the afternoon relaxing in The Quad.

Community members are welcome to purchase food from the CBD and bring it along, enjoy the BBQ provided for a gold coin donation, grab something from the Slate bar and café (which will be open all afternoon) or stay for dinner at one of Lismore's many CBD restaurants.

One Year On begins at 2pm on Saturday, 7 April in The Quad.

BOOK NOW FOR FREE RURAL LANDHOLDER FIELD DAYS

Our Rural Landholder Initiative – a major project under Council's **Biodiversity Management Strategy – continues in 2018 with free** field days for local landholders.

These field days are designed to help local farmers, growers and lifestyle landholders network and meet people living and working on the land and learn techniques for best-practice methods that aid biodiversity, production and farm health.

If you're a rural landholder join us for one of the field days below. They are all free and lunch is included.

Vine Weeds and Healthy Creeks

Saturday, 21 April, 9am-2pm, Jiqqi

Landholders battling to manage vine weeds in bushlands and creeks are invited to this event.

The day will feature options available for integrated management of weeds, including biological controls for cat's claw creeper, Madeira vine, and other environmental weeds on a local cattle property.

Practical demonstrations with the safe use of chemicals in the riparian zone will be provided.

Learn how to make a self-assessment of the health of your creek and access help to plan your own restoration project. Includes creek bank and paddock walk.

Fire & Biodiversity Forum at Nimbin Friday, 1 June, 10am-2.30pm

In collaboration with the Northern Rivers Fire and Biodiversity Consortium, council invites people from Nimbin and surrounding rural communities to join fire ecologists and planners at a forum aimed at improving understanding of on-ground fire management practices.

Targeted information and local examples will assist landholders to develop knowledge about:

- What is 'Ecological Fire'.
- Fire dependency versus fire sensitivity of habitats and the impacts of too little fire versus too much.
- Understanding and managing the fire-related needs of local flora and fauna.
- The rules of burning ecological and human.
- How to integrate hazard reduction planning, community safety and cultural practices interest with plans for ecological burning.
- Steps to gaining approval and getting a burn done.
- Where to go to get help or learn more.

Planning your Restoration Project Friday, 13 July, 9am–2pm

Rural landholders who are new to the land often inherit old problems that need managing alongside inherent site risks. This day will help you identify priorities and limitations on your own property and plan management actions to achieve long and short-term goals.

Using a local property as a case study, experts from a range of organisations will discuss how a planned approach can support sustainable projects, whether that is alternative land uses, primary production, weed control or improving biodiversity.

COUNCIL DECIDES...

At the 13 March ordinary meeting, Council decisions included the following:

* Council resolved (7/3 in favour with one absent) to agree in principle to write off \$2,329 in ground hire fees requested by Marist Brothers (Lismore Old Boys Rugby League Football Club Incorporated). This proposal is now on public exhibition until 28 April for community feedback. Submissions can be made online at www.lismore.nsw.gov.au via the 'Your Say Lismore' community consultation portal, emailed to council@lismore. nsw.gov.au or sent to the General Manager, Lismore City Council, PO Box 23A, Lismore, NSW 2480. Submissions must be received by 28 April 2018.

* Council resolved (6/5 in favour) to inform the Minister for Local Government of endorsement for the establishment of a Northern Rivers Joint Organisation, and that it be established to cover the Local Government Areas of Lismore, Ballina, Byron, Kyogle, Richmond Valley and Tweed. Council will also write a letter of support for the inclusion of Rous County Council as an associate member (non-voting representative) of the Northern Rivers Joint Organisation.

* Council resolved (10/1 in favour) to allocate \$100,000 from pocket park divestment strategy funds towards the Kadina Park upgrade to be combined with a Stronger Country Communities Fund matching grant and \$20,000 from the Rotary Club of Goonellabah.

PLEASE HEED RECYCLING CHANGES

As mentioned last fortnight, a clamp down by China on its recycling policy means that we are no longer sending plastics, cardboard or paper to be recycled overseas.

However, please be clear - this does not mean any recycling is being sent to landfill. That is a myth.

We are currently finding new markets for our recycling in Australia and stockpiling some products we cannot sell. We know we have to clean up our act - the cleaner our recycling streams, the easier it is to find new markets for sale and remanufacture.

While the policy change in China is presenting challenges for councils across Australia, the good news is that it's a catalyst for innovation and change within the industry. Governments are now looking for solutions to process recycling on-shore, which is good for jobs and ultimately better for the environment.

We are also exploring possibilities within the Northern Rivers to remanufacture plastics, paper and cardboard, and develop entirely closed-loop systems.

Good examples of current closed-loop systems are our organics and glass recycling. All food and garden waste collected from green bins is composted and sold to gardeners and farmers across the region, while all glass from kerbside bins is crushed and used in pipe bedding, drainage and road bases. The materials are processed locally and used locally, creating a closed-loop system with no waste or environmental cost from transport.

While we investigate solutions, the best thing we can do as a community is avoid over-packaged products and choose to reuse (think reusable coffee cups and drink bottles, and saying no to plastic bags).

We are now asking residents to follow the simple rules below.

• Keep your recycling clean. Most things that are fairly clean are fine, like an empty beer bottle, but if something has lots of food in it, please give it a rinse. Keep it simple: recycle aluminium, steel, glass, hard plastic, bagged up soft

plastics, paper and cardboard.

- Do not put anything smaller than business card size into your recycling bin.
- Keep stuff like hoses, pipes and anything that has many different types of materials in it (e.g. a plastic toy with bits of steel) out of your recycling bin.
- Keep contamination out. The main offenders are: dirty nappies, clothing, shoes and things that get tangled up such as rope, hose and fairy lights.
