

YELLOW CRAZY ANT SURVEILLANCE THIS WEEKEND

You may have received a letter regarding a yellow crazy ant surveillance exercise that is taking place within a 20km radius of Lismore CBD this weekend (1-2 September).

A colony of yellow crazy ants was first detected in the Lismore CBD in May and the NSW Department of Primary Industries (NSW DPI) treated these ants as well as an outlying infestation in Terania Creek in July.

Ongoing surveillance has also identified several smaller infestations in outlying areas which are currently being treated.

It is now time to inspect the region to see if the treatment has worked and if the infestation of yellow crazy ants has been contained.

This weekend, representatives from the DPI, Police, Rural Fire Service and SES will be inspecting front and backyards of selected properties for yellow crazy ants. This means you may get a knock on your door!

Uniformed staff from participating agencies will knock on your door and ask permission to inspect your property. If the ants are found, the team will treat the ants and any nests with non-toxic lures. The treatment is not dangerous for humans or pets.

Inspectors will not enter any buildings.
People are asked to help by restraining pets
while the inspections are carried out.

This is a good opportunity to have a trained officer inspect your yard and garden areas to see if it is free from yellow crazy ants. However, if you would prefer not to have someone visit, please let the NSW DPI know on the day or contact them prior to the day on the Biosecurity Hotline 1800 680 244.

Inspections will be carried out between 8am and 5pm on Saturday, 1 September and Sunday, 2 September.

Movement Control Zone

Movement restrictions are still in place, affecting properties in a five kilometre radius of the Lismore CBD. This means you cannot move vegetation, plant matter or green waste out of the Movement Control Zone unless it is being moved or transported directly to the Lismore Recycling & Recovery Centre.

COUNCIL DECIDES...

At the 14 August ordinary meeting, Council decisions included the following:

- 1/ Council resolved (6/5 in favour) to discontinue the Lismore Business Panel and thank members for their contribution on the current committee and over the past 10 years. To conduct an internal review of the Special Rates Variation (SRV) governance process, prior to the end of 2018, with a view to proposing a new structure moving forward for the ongoing management of the SRV program. To give interim management of the SRV program to Council's Tourism and events team and partners with the Lismore Chamber of Commerce and Industry, as per this report, to ensure that SRV monies are properly expended until a new structure is in place. Agree to providing financial assistance to Business – Inner CBD ratepayers totalling \$246,400 to be applied on a proportionate basis (individual Business – Inner CBD rates as a percentage of total Business – Inner CBD rates for 2018/19) and that \$96,400 of the SRV promotion levy program funds to be collected in 2018/19 be included in the total monies provided. The provision of financial assistance to Business – Inner CBD ratepayers be exhibited for a period of 28 days and submissions considered by Council prior to final determination. To write to all property owners and business operators, on successful determination of the motion, informing them of the total decrease in outgoings, urging them to look at way the additional funds could be used to boost CBD visitation, local business promotion and marketing, events and placemaking. Direct the General Manager report to Council as part of the next budget process on options to make business rates more equitable and business inner CBD rates reduced.
- 2/ Council resolved (unanimous) to support the combined LGNSW and NSWPLA funding campaign 'Renew our Libraries'. To write to the state government to express deep disappointment at the state governments decision to cut 18% from the state library budget and demands that this funding be restored.
- **3/** Council resolved (9/1 in favour with one absent) to participate in community efforts to help provide stock feed and water to those drought affected families. To work together with Kyogle Shire Council and Richmond Valley Council to each provide a float truck loaded with hay, and a water tanker which will cart water from Tamworth to drought affected families this weekend.
- **4/** Council resolved (7/2 in favour with two absent) that the 2018.19 fees and charged for swim teams season centre hire be set at \$10 per member.
- 5/ Council resolved (6/5 with the Mayor using his casting vote)
 - **1.** To adopt Amendment No. 24 to the Development Control Plan Amendment to Part B Chapter 3 Lismore Cultural Precinct as contained in Attachment 1 of this report subject to the following amendments;
- Replacing Principle 4 in Section 3.4 of Part B Chapter 3 with the following:
 - Principle 4 Pedestrians, linkages and public open space

Development is to be well integrated with the existing development on the site,

surrounding public open space, sports facilities and the CBD. Pedestrians are to be prioritised over vehicle activity in the design and layout of the precinct. Legible, aesthetically pleasing pedestrian linkages are to be provided to Lismore Park, Oakes Oval, adjoining cultural facilities and the CBD. Clear sight lines and lighting will be provided along walkways for pedestrians. A potential footbridge over Dawson St should be considered as part of the pedestrian network. Public spaces and pedestrian linkages will have as much activated frontage as possible.

• Inserting new Principle 9 in Section 3.4 of Part B Chapter 3 as follows:

Principle 9 Ecologically Sustainable Development

New buildings are to incorporate features to maximise water and energy efficiency, provide enhanced thermal comfort and utilise water sensitive urban design. Rooftop solar power is to be integrated into the building design. New development is to have Green Star Certification provided by the Green Building Council Australia or equivalent recognised energy efficiency rating scheme.

- **2.** Proceed to give notice of its decision in Local Matters in accordance with section 21 of the Environmental Planning and Assessment Regulation 2000.
- **6/** Council resolved an amendment (7/3 in favour with one absent) to not send a delegation to Lincang, China.
- 7/ Council voted against (2/8 in favour with one absent) not proceeding with making an application to the Regional Cultural Fund (Round 2) stream of the NSW State Government Regional Growth Fund. To consider future grant funding opportunities for the proposed new library and associated infrastructure. To provide in-kind support to the Northern Rivers Performing Arts (NORPA) to assist with their preparation and development of an application to the Regional Cultural Fund (Round 2).
- **8/** Council resolved (8/1 in favour with two absent) to approve the addition of two new community members to the Sister City Advisory Panel and conduct an expression of interest process as outlined in the report to make appointments.

NEW EXHIBITION AN ODE TO DIGBY'S ISLAND HOME

A new exhibition opening this weekend at the Lismore Regional Gallery explores the life and art of local Indigenous painter
Albert (Digby) Moran.

The exhibition, *Growing Up on The Island*, will be opened by the artist this Friday, 31 August from 5.30pm at the gallery.

Digby was born in Ballina and raised on Cabbage Tree Island. His father was Dungutti and his mother Bundjalung. He is a highly respected member of the Lismore/Ballina community and one of the region's most highly regarded artists.

Moran's life is compartmentalised into two parts: before he started painting and after. He worked in agriculture and was also a boxer before he turned his hand to painting. In 1991 he undertook an art course through TAFE which launched his career as an artist.

For Digby, painting provides a vehicle to express his stories with a strong focus on his time at Cabbage Tree Island.

"Those were my happiest years growing up there," he said.

As a storyteller, Digby accesses traditions passed on to him by his paternal grandfather, using this as his inspiration to paint and express his Bundjalung heritage.

Moran's studio was badly affected by the 2017 Lismore flood and he lost most of his materials, and much of his work.

This exhibition is the result of a burst of creativity Digby has undergone since the flood, and is a celebration of an artist with undeterred resilience.

Growing up on The Island is on show until 14 October.

The gallery is open Tuesday, Wednesday, Friday, Saturday and Sunday from 10am to 4pm and Thursday 10am to 6pm. It is closed Mondays. Entry is free.

TRAFFIC ALERT: ROADWORKS

Please allow for additional travel time if travelling through our roadworks:

Keen Street between Conway and Magellan Streets, CBD

Keen Street will be under traffic controls over the coming weeks as we fix the road and upgrade parking here. This will also disrupt onstreet parking to allow room for us to remove the median strip and do roadworks.

The first stage of works will require us to temporarily close the northbound lane between the Lismore Centro carpark entry and Magellan Street. This will allow us to construct a new landscaped central parking area here and convert the outside lane to parallel parking to match the parking to the north.

A detour will be in place for travel into the CBD via Dawson or Molesworth Streets. The southbound lane of Keen Street will remain open as will access to the Lismore Centro Carpark.


The next stage of works will be to fix the rest of Keen Street between Conway and Magellan Streets. We will keep you updated as roadworks progress and ask that you continue to support our local businesses despite the traffic disruptions. Alternative carparking is available in the Harold Fredericks Car Park on the corner of Magellan and Dawson Street 100m away.

Wyrallah Road north of Wyrallah village (fixing the road)

Traffic delays can be expected as we progress onto the next stage of roadworks for 0.5km north of Wyrallah village over the coming weeks.

Wilson Street between the new bridge and Elliott Road, South Lismore (fixing the road)

Traffic delays can be expected here for a few days as we fix this section of road sometime in the coming weeks.
