The Elders Back Lismore Show will return to the Lismore Showground on 19, 20 and 21 October.


For 138 years, the Show is where our community comes together to have a bit of fun. It's three days of family fun entertainment.

WEED ALERT: SEEDED BANANA (MUSA SPECIES)

It looks like a Ladyfinger banana, but don't be fooled by the Seeded banana's appearance. Seeded banana is an invasive weed and a biosecurity threat to our region.

Seeded banana's inedible fruit contain up to 200 seeds which can be spread by fruit-eating animals as well as being dispersed by waterways. Its large leaves hamper the growth of native understory plants, and its roots degrade soil nutrients.

Seeded banana is known to host the Banana Aphid, an insect which spreads Bunchy Top disease, one of the most serious diseases to strike the banana industry. For this reason, banana plants can only be purchased through approved suppliers.


SMALL BUSINESS MONTH

CONSTRUCTION OF LISMORE TO BENTLEY RAIL TRAIL

In 2021 Lismore City Council was successful in securing funding from the Commonwealth Government, to construct the Lismore to Bentley section of the Northern Rivers Rail Trail. This project will facilitate an active and alternative form of transport for residents and communities in the region. The rail trail will also be a considerable tourist attraction – a notable addition to the active tourism offerings of the region.

The objective of this tender is to select a suitable contractor to conduct construction of the rail trail according to the outlined specifications in the package.

At the Ordinary Council Meeting held on Tuesday, 10 October, Councillors resolved to:

 Suite 8 and the attached store room at 27 Oliver Avenue, Goonellabah,
 for a term of five years for the permitted use of: Lismore Senior Citizens
 Social Club Activities.

- Item A **Lease to Lismore City Council** over Suite 6, 164 Molesworth Street, Lismore for Lismore Regional Gallery's continued use of the office space in line with funding from the State Government

- Item B Lease to Lismore City Council over Shop 3, 164 Molesworth Street, Lismore for Lismore Regional Gallery's continuation of the Lismore Regional Gallery Pop up Gallery in line with funding from the State Government.

- Contact Transport for NSW, Department of Planning and Environment-Heritage and Janelle Saffin MP requesting as a matter of urgency, an accelerated process to be fast-tracked to remove the rail bridge and reopen Terania Street due to safety concerns and the impact on local business. This is to be followed by the removal of the below rail bridges:
- Union Street and Frank Street
- Crane Street between Barrow Lane and Simmons Street
- Alexandria Parade near Flick Street
- Winterton Parade near the Lismore Turf Club (preferably during school holidays)
- The General Manager provided a response in the Business paper regarding why the CSIRO should not be sought out and asked to be the lead agency undertaking a Regional Vision and Masterplan. No further action was taken.
